School Uniform

Student Insurance - Reminder from DET

Parents are reminded that the Department of Education and Training (DET) does not offer any form of 'student accident insurance'. If families are concerned about this they are advised to make their own arrangements.

Ambulance cover could be one consideration as the school will not hesitate to call an ambulance if we are concerned for a child's wellbeing.

Personal Goods brought to school at the 'Owners' risk

The Department of Education and Training (DET) does not hold insurance for personal property brought to schools.

All schools are requested to remind students and parents/guardians of this at the beginning of each academic year and to discourage parents/students from bringing any unnecessary or particularly valuable items to school.

Please avoid bringing these items as it can be most upsetting for all concerned if items go missing or are damaged.

Arriving at School on-time

Thank-you to the many families who ensure their child arrives on time to school every day. Punctuality is an important life skill and a great habit to form early in life.

Students ideally should arrive at school around 8.45am, which allows enough time to enjoy a quick catch up with friends before entering the classroom at 8:50am for Reading (P-2) or Mindfulness (Yr. 3-6). School officially starts at 9.00am when the roll is marked.

We are asking that children do not arrive at school early unless they remain in the care of an adult until 8.45am to ensure they are supervised adequately.

Emerging outbreak of novel coronavirus

Information on the emerging outbreak of novel coronavirus

Cases have been reported predominantly in the city of Wuhan, in the Hubei province of China, as well as in other Chinese cities and in other countries, including at least one confirmed case at the time of writing in Victoria, Australia.

The Australian Government has advised that there is no cause for alarm with respect to the coronavirus and that the risk to the Australian public remains relatively low.

The Department has consulted with Victoria's Chief Health Officer and Department of Health and Human Services to provide the following advice to schools and local communities:

Remind your staff and students that everyone can protect against infections by practising good hand hygiene and respiratory hygiene. Cover your mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing with a tissue, or cough into your elbow, dispose of the tissue into a bin and then wash your hands afterwards. Wash your hands regularly, after using the toilet, and before eating.

Health promotion materials are available to distribute and promote to your staff, students and families, see:

- Wash your hands regularly poster
- Cover your cough and sneeze poster
- Be a Soapy Hero!

If you are an International Student Program school, work closely with your homestay families who are hosting international students from Wuhan City or other areas where the virus has been reported so that they are assured of the relatively low risk and know to seek medical advice where appropriate. For information you may wish to provide to your homestay families, visit Information for the public - Novel Coronavirus

In accordance with national public health guidelines and current information about the coronavirus from the Commonwealth Chief Medical Officer and the World Health Organisation, exclusion of well children or staff from school who have travelled to Wuhan, China, or any other areas where there have been reported cases is NOT required, unless the following applies:

- · the person is a confirmed case of novel coronavirus; or
- the person is a close contact with a confirmed case of novel coronavirus in the past 14 days.

For staff and students who experience flu-like symptoms AND have recently travelled to Wuhan City, Hubei province, or had close contact with a confirmed case:

- seek medical advice for any staff or students in your care who experience fever and respiratory
 symptoms (including but not limited to cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, body aches or
 fatigue) AND have recently travelled to Wuhan City or had close contact with a confirmed case in the
 14 days before of the onset of illness. Call ahead to notify the medical practitioner of recent travel; and
- contact the Department of Health and Human Services and inform Clarinda PS and the Department of Education and Training. The Department of Education and Training will ensure appropriate support is provided.

Clarinda Primary School Specialist Program to support Student Learning Outcomes

The Victorian Curriculum gives students the skills they need for work and life: literacy, numeracy, scientific knowledge and skills, resilience, respectful relationships, the use of digital technologies and the capacity for critical and creative thinking and expression.

At Clarinda Primary School, we are working to equip students with the broad range of skills they need to reach their potential, and achieve success in school and in life.

Literacy and numeracy are key life skills that enable students to learn and thrive in all curriculum areas. Success in these foundational areas at school will benefit students for the rest of their lives.

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) skills, along with the ability to think critically and find creative solutions for complex problems are vital for future employment opportunities, in our rapidly changing world.

The main source of funding (resources) for Clarinda Primary School is distributed through the Student Resource Package (SRP). Most of the money included in the package is Core Student Funding, which is worked out based on enrolment numbers, stages of learning and the school's location.

We have the flexibility to invest in programs and interventions that are best suited to the students at school. Our Strategic Plan (2017-2020) helps to set student outcome targets to focus our resources on student needs at the local level in a way that is backed up by expert advice and robust evidence.

The Victorian Curriculum F–10 sets out what every student should learn during their first eleven years of schooling. The curriculum is the common set of knowledge and skills required by students for life-long learning, social development and active and informed citizenship.

In 2020, students at Clarinda Primary School will complete all Learning Areas and Capabilities.

To assist students to reach their outcomes, we also offer a Specialist program including:

Visual Arts
Performing Arts
Language – Greek
Physical Education

STEM – Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths.

Visual Arts

Learning in Visual Arts involves students making and responding to artworks and drawing on the world as a source of ideas. Students engage with and develop knowledge of visual arts, skills, techniques and processes, and use materials as they explore a range of forms, styles and contexts.

Through Visual Arts, students learn to reflect critically on their own experiences and responses to the work of artists, craftspeople and designers and to develop their own arts' knowledge. They learn, with growing sophistication, to express and communicate experiences through and about visual arts.

Performing Arts

In Music, students listen to, compose and perform music in a wide range of styles from diverse cultures, times and locations. Listening underpins all music learning. Students compose and perform music using the voice, body, instruments, sound sources, and digital technologies. As composers, they create music in different styles and forms exploring personal interests and given ideas. Students develop their ability to identify and describe, using terminology and symbols (notation), aspects of the music they listen to, compose and perform. Learning through Music is a continuous and sequential process, enabling the acquisition, development and revisiting of skills and knowledge with increasing depth and complexity

Greek (Language other than English – LOTE)

Students acquire communication skills in the specific Roman Alphabet (Modern Greek) language they are learning. They develop understanding about the role of language and culture in communication. Their reflections on language use and language learning are applied in other learning contexts. Learning languages broadens students' horizons about the personal, social, cultural and employment opportunities that are available in an increasingly interconnected and interdependent world. The interdependence of countries and communities requires people to negotiate experiences and meanings across languages and cultures. A bilingual or plurilingual capability is the norm in most parts of the world.

Physical Education

In Health and Physical Education, students develop the knowledge, understanding and skills to strengthen their sense of self, and build and manage satisfying relationships.

The curriculum helps them to be resilient, and to make decisions and take actions to promote their health, safety and physical activity participation. As students mature, they develop and use critical inquiry skills to research and analyse the knowledge of the field and to understand the influences on their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing.

They also learn to use resources for the benefit of themselves and for the communities with which they identify and to which they belong.

STEM

Science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education includes both the specific knowledge and skills in these four learning areas and the inter-relationship between them.

This recognises that there are opportunities for STEM learning to be delivered in an integrated way, supporting deeper engagement in these four learning areas.

Students from Yr. 3-6 will attend the program during Term 1, 2, 3 and 4. Students from P-2 will participate in STEM lessons with their classroom teacher.

Programs are evaluated annually through careful strategic planning and a robust consultative process, reflecting on the school's past performance, establishing future directions and deciding on what will increased student outcomes to achieve our vision for your child in our school.
