Clarinda Primary School

Clarinda PS is one of those very schools. The staff are fantastic, and among them is Erin Beissel who is the 2021 Victorian Education Excellence Awards reigning Teacher Of The Year.

There are an increasing number of schools that I recommend educators to go and visit. Clarinda has been hosting visits for me for a couple of years now (COVID permitting!). They have quality whole school approaches in the teaching of reading and writing, and are now building this into the numeracy space.

When it comes to phonics, Clarinda follows the research.

Despite what you might hear, the research is clear that phonics instructions should be systematic (not to be confused with synthetic!), and explicit. For some schools this can mean that all students receive the same instruction, and for some students, this can extend well beyond when it is needed. Too much of a focus on phonics can impact on a student's ability to make meaning from texts.

What schools like Clarinda do is that they use a scope and sequence, combined with assessment, to differentiate what the whole class needs, what small groups need, and what individuals need. Once students have completed the assessment they no longer need phonics instruction. Phonics is an important, but only one part of their comprehensive literacy program.

The assessment and scope sequence Clarinda use, is from a resource by Heidi Anne Mesmer titled, 'Letter Lessons and First Words'.

The book provides suggested curriculum, activities and timelines for each aspect of the scope and sequence. Clarinda use this as a starting point, and they have also created their own resources to complement this work.

COVID 19

As has been said several times already this year, we continue to be thankful the support of our community in promoting a COVIDsafe start to 2022. Walking around the school each day the exhilaration and joy of being back with each other remains profound. Great schools are made of great people, and we are energised daily as we see the children playing, working and socialising together.

Almost exactly two years ago our world changed in incomprehensible ways. Providing a 'wake-up call' for many of us, COVID continues to impact us, with scores of families in our community staying home due to illness, and many quarantining (as a result of a positive home test result).

Most of the time the world is a fabulous, beautiful place, but scary and unsettling things happen from time to time. We've seen stories of flood waters inundating homes and lives being lost, the conflict in Eastern Europe that many fear will become a war, and the passing of cricket legends. When they do, remind your children that this is unusual which is why it's in the news.

Our children need the world to feel safe and secure. The more they feel this, the more they can explore life with confidence, look to the future with hope, and find a meaningful way forward.

Ever notice that getting more information (watching the news or scrolling social media) does not reduce your worries and fears? Children don't need lots of information; they need to feel safe. What we do makes a difference. If you are feeling emotional or overwhelmed, your child/ren will sense it - and catch it. Rather than asking your child 'Are you ok?' try asking 'I noticed you were pretty affected by that horrible news' and do this while side-by-side. Perhaps it's a car ride, beside their bed at night, or while you're doing an activity together. Side-by-side conversations feel less threatening.



Continuing from the above, as a school community we continue to work together effectively to keep our kids at school and minimise any spread of COVID-19. We are very grateful for the support of all parents and carers to implement the various strategies. One thing we would like to remind everyone is not sending children to school when they are unwell or have any cold or flu type symptoms, such as a cough or runny nose.

Even if your child has undertaken a negative rapid test, they still need to stay home until the symptoms have cleared up. We thank you for your support with this as students showing any symptoms will be sent home as we look to protect our staff and students and keep school open.

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School Camp

Our school has one of the best camping programs I have seen operate in any school, with each camp experience complementing the last; starting with a two night year 5/6 camp at Creswick, a Year 3/4 later in the year and a Year 2 sleepover.

Staff complete several risk assessments and Department of Education and Training (DET) documents that must be completed months out of any camps occurring. Along with the time spent planning each school camp to ensure that experiences are fun and educational beyond the standard curriculum, and memories are built for a lifetime, we

appreciate the generosity of time given by our teachers for the time spent away from their homes to make camps happen.

Parent and Community Club (PACC)

The first meeting of the year is scheduled for Wednesday 23rd March at 2:30pm. For those unable to attend on-site, a WebEx link will be sent prior to the meeting.

Parents' clubs (alternatively called parents' associations) promote the welfare of, and provide support to, the school and its community. Parents are key partners in their child's learning. By interacting with the school and other parents, parents' club members can use their skills and experience to work collaboratively with others in supporting the school and its students, and build a sense of community within the school.

The role of a parents' club is threefold:

- to provide support, in various forms, for the school, its students and community, including raising funds for the benefit of the school
- to work in cooperation with the principal, staff and school council in building effective partnerships between home and school
- to encourage diversity by getting to know the parents of other children at the school, and to support the operation of the school

Parking

Over the past two weeks, I have been spoken to by a number of community members who are concerned about the congestion around the school and, in particular, the unlawful parking of many cars, be it in/or across driveways, remaining for longer than 2 minutes in 'No Standing' zones, and using our staff carpark.



When the Kiss and Go zone is used properly on Crawford Road and Eulinga Road, the traffic flows extremely well and frees up other spots around the school where parents can park and drop their child off in person, safely.

SHOWING OUR KIDS EMPATHY

SHOWING OUR KIDS EMPATHY

Empathy is the heart of Love and Logic and we need to show it to our kids or students even more now during the current pandemic. If we consistently fail to communicate a sincere desire to understand what kids are going through now, we aren't using Love and Logic.

There are times when I blow it. Does this happen to you? If so, remember that none of us are perfect. We all fall short of this unrealistic standard. The clues that I might not be showing empathy can be subtle, such as:

- I find myself in more arguments.
- The people around me seem to find all sorts of creative ways of not doing what I want. Sometimes they forget. Sometimes they comply but do a sloppier job. Sometimes they do exactly the opposite of what I ask.
- I'm frustrated and exhausted.

Love and Logic people make it a point to continue learning. Take this quick quiz to gauge your understanding and application of empathy. For each of the following scenarios involving your child or your student, choose the most empathetic response.

A child is upset about moving to another community.

- a. Don't worry. You'll make new friends.
- b. I know how you feel.
- c. Why are you being so negative?
- It looks like you are really hurting over having to leave.
- The child played poorly during the soccer game.

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- c. It seems like you are feeling really disappointed.
- The center ref was terrible. I can see why you are upset.
- The child is crying and says, "Nobody likes me."

 - d. Go ask Ava. She'll be your friend.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
