2022 Education State Conference

School Principals throughout Victoria came together to attend the Education State Principal's Conference on Monday 30th and Tuesday 31st May at the Melbourne Convention Centre. The two days were spent on exploring the research that underpins excellence in teaching and learning through the theme of;

"Stronger Together: Every Student, Every School".

Of particular note was the presentation by Professor John Hattie on Day 1 who covered a range of issues, but particularly focussed on the impacts of Covid on student learning and how changes that were forced upon both students and schools have altered how students learn today. Professor Hattie noted;

- that the evidence clearly shows a drop in student confidence
- that following Covid, too many students are scared of taking on challenges. They would prefer to do what they already know which is the exact opposite of what we want to achieve at CPS.

When you consider that when a student is a confident learner, they can learn at 1.5 x the normal rate, then having a lack of confidence can lead to students stagnating and even going backwards. Hattie challenged schools to work with students and help them understand that 100% on a test simply means that the student was not tested at the correct level.

In modern education, tests allow teachers to identify what a student knows and what they need to work on next, or their "Point of Need". It is up to us as a school and as parents to allow students to fail. The fear of failure is stifling a student's ability to scale up their learning successes.

In short, Covid has created a bubble where student do just enough and are therefore



Stronger Together: Every Student, Every School

We know that student motivation drops from the beginning of schooling until approximately Year 10, when it takes a slight upturn. Along the way, students become more concerned about the validation of their peers than school work, the very definition of too cool for school. During Covid we did see some positive shifts for many students though. Many students, but not all, thrived with the opportunity to be independent learners. Some loved the application of technology and others liked being able to do their work in a timeframe that suited them. As a school, we must explore the best of a bad situation and use some of the new strategies gained to improve student learning outcomes. In the end, we don't know what we don't know, so there will always be a place for guidance to empower students to seek new learning. Throughout 2022 and over the life of our current strategic plan, staff will work towards helping students to set their own, realistic and challenging learning goals, whilst building our own capacity to be able to assess for differentiation and develop our teaching to ensure we are meeting each child's point of need. Of course, first and foremost we must build resilience, motivation and confidence so that our students can push themselves further.

Through Play is the Way, we are helping create a safe learning environment where students can take on new challenges with the understanding that they may fail before they prosper, which is exactly what it takes to be a student that Cares, Achieves, Respects and Excels.

Mid-Year Reports - Information for Parents

Our teachers have been very busy in the past few weeks analysing mid-year assessments and writing student reports. Like most schools in Victoria, our reporting process includes two formal reports, one at mid-year and one in December. It takes many hours to prepare these reports, and our aim is to make sure they are easy to understand and provide a clear indication of each child's progress when assessed against the Victorian Curriculum. The report includes a table showing the current progress in a range of curriculum areas, a written comment related to personal qualities and two further more detailed tables for English and Mathematics to show children's progress in recent learning. Reports are also included for each specialist program, with a description of the learning focus, and comments regarding children's progress. A sample of the table showing progress against the Victorian Curriculum is included above.

Arrival Time at School

Just a reminder to everyone, that children should not be arriving at school before 8.50am. Before this time there is no yard duty supervision or supervision outside of the gates. If the weather is wet it's not always possible to let children in until teaches are in their classrooms.

The Election Day Democracy Sausage was a huge success for our school. With just over \$2,000 raised, the money will be contributed toward the "Raise the Playground' project."

I am currently the drafting stage of a submission to the Suburban Rail Loop who are offering grant of up to \$80,000 for community-based projects. Hopefully, a successful application will fast track the \$100,000 required to build a playground with a shade structure.

On behalf of our school council, I wish to thank the families who have recently assisted the school through attending to School Contributions Payments for 2022, with many families chipping away at payment plans and online payments. As mentioned before on numerous occasions, our school maintains outstanding resources and outdoor play areas for the children to access that are certainly envied by many other state schools.

The breadth of programs that we run is way above a basic standard curriculum in a public school and this must make an impact of the life opportunities of the children, as they demonstrate outstanding results in standardised tests, and various competitions time and time again.

Thank you to all families who continue to support our school in some little (and often big) way here and there. The children, and staff cherish the opportunities presented to them.

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Rapid Antigen Tests

Free rapid antigen tests will continue to be available for all staff and students in Victorian schools in Term 2, 2022. The next batch will be distributed this Friday.

It is recommended that rapid antigen tests are used by students when symptomatic.

Rapid antigen tests are also required to be used for five days if a student is an identified close contact of a confirmed case, and they are attending school.

If students receive a positive test result at any time, they <u>must report this through the Department of Health system</u> (<u>Rapid antigen tests | Coronavirus Victoria</u>) or via the Corona virus hotline at 1800 675 398.
















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
