# National Simultaneous Storytime

All students and staff at Clarinda Primary School recently participated in the National Simultaneous Storytime.

National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country.

Now in its 23rd successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6. This year's book was 'The Speedy Sloth' written by Rebecca Young and illustrated by Heath McKenzie.

# About the author

Rebecca Young is an award-winning author from Sydney. Her first book, Button Boy, illustrated by Sue deGennaro, was a Notable Book for the 2012 CBCA Awards and has been published internationally.

In 2016, Teacup, illustrated by Matt Ottley, won the Patricia Wrightson Prize for Children's Literature in the NSW Premier's Literacy Awards.

# About the illustrator

Heath McKenzie is an award-winning children's book illustrator who has written and illustrated countless books for children. Heath lives in Melbourne with his wife, two kids, dog, and a fish that he considers more of a lodger than a family member.

# Illnesses



We are experiencing a significant rise in flu/cold (Covid cases) for both students and staff this term. As you would be aware, the Covid Guidelines have changed with the passing of time, reflecting changing conditions. Current Covid Guidelines require staff to stay home for 5 days if they contract Covid. For students, the guidelines recommend a 5-day stay at home from school.

Whilst it is not a requirement for students, we would strongly recommend that parents consider doing so to keep our school a healthy place to learn and work in. We ask that any student showing signs of illness do not attend school. As per department guidelines, any student presenting with compatible symptoms sore throat, cough, fever, or cold -like symptoms a parent/guardian will be required to collect the student as soon as possible.

Clarinda Primary School always endeavours to cover class absences with a Causal Relief Teacher. In recent weeks this has become increasingly difficult to do, due to the higher number of staff absences due to illness and Casual Relief Teacher shortages via the many companies we utilise. Therefore, we have spent countless early morning hours innovating and remodelling classroom structures via splitting/combining cohorts, re-deployment of staff from their designated roles (specialists, intervention) to cover the teaching needs across the school. We appreciate your ongoing support in minimising the spread of respiratory illnesses and viruses.

# RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS at Clarinda Primary School

Over the last few years, staff have been implementing a new initiative called Respectful Relationships at CPS. We are very proud of the work all our staff, students and community members have done in relation to the initiative so far, and we are looking forward to weaving Respectful Relationships further into the fabric of our everyday teaching and learning at CPS.

# What is Respectful Relationships?

Respectful Relationships is about tackling family violence through education.

Rosie Batty, CEO of the Luke Batty Foundation "the school community is an essential part of social reform by modelling a culture of respect through the whole school, not just by teaching respect in the classroom".

In 2017, respectful relationships education will be taught as part of the Victorian curriculum. The Victorian Government is supporting schools to model respectful relationships across the whole school community as part of its commitment to respectful relationships education.

The Government is providing Victorian schools with a range of extra support and resources including new Respectful Relationships teaching and learning materials.

In the classroom, children will learn problem-solving skills, to develop empathy, support their own wellbeing and build healthy relationships with others. The initiative will also provide resources to best support children and staff who are affected by family violence.

When children build positive relationships with their teachers and peers, they feel safer and happier at school, are more resilient and have positive social attitudes. Positive relationships also increase a child's sense of social connectedness and belonging which can result in better health and academic outcomes.



On Wednesday 31<sup>st</sup> May, we had 7 students from Grades 3-6 running against over 40 other schools at Division Cross Country.


It was a new venue for all of our students, and the track was very challenging. It's such a wonderful experience for our team, as the more familiar they are with the terrain, the better their results are each year.














Congratulations to Zac in 5/6A who has had his writing published after entering a writing competition.

A fantastic achievement!



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
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"It is a power to summon any animal one wishes. It is worth trillions and trillions of dollars."
